Do you or someone you know struggle to live without central heating?

Suffolk's *Warm Homes Healthy People* service (supported by all the District, Borough and County Councils in Suffolk) has secured funding from central government to help 270 households across Suffolk have fully-funded central heating. Terms and conditions apply.

To qualify, households *must meet one or more* of the following financial criteria: Have a household income of less than £17,000; *or* be in receipt of Pension Credit; *or* be in receipt of any other means tested benefit; *or* spend more than 10% of net household income on fuel; *or* be in substantial fuel debt (over £1,000). In all circumstances the property must be owned by you or be privately rented (i.e. not a council house or housing association property) and *must only have room heaters, open fires or storage heaters*. Personal saving must also not be in excess of £20,000.

In most circumstances the works will be carried out *at no charge to you* but if you rent privately your landlord may be expected to fund some of the costs. This will be determined as part of the assessment process.

Due to the limited funding more vulnerable residents will be given priority.

New charge for rubble, soil and plasterboard

Suffolk residents taking rubble, soil and plasterboard to Suffolk Household Waste Recycling Centres are being advised that current restrictions to the amounts allowed will soon be removed, and small charges will apply. From 1 April 2016, residents will be able to bring unlimited amounts rubble, soil, hardcore and plasterboard* to Suffolk Recycling Centres and a charge will be made according to the amount presented, starting from £2 per 25kg bag. This will help to reduce costs of the service as part of the overall 2016/2017 budget savings. The new arrangements remove the current two bag limit on these types of materials at Recycling Centres.

IT'S ALL SO LONG AGO Extracts from Parish Magazines from the past

ALAN VINCE

95 YEARS AGO: JANUARY 1921:

On January 15^{th} a Musical afternoon is being arranged; a varied Entertainment will be given, from 4 to 7 o'clock, with an interval for tea, to be followed by Dancing till 10.30 pm. One shilling will be charged for admission (including tax), and refreshments will be extra.

60 YEARS AGO – Newton Newsleaf produced by Rev A G Ensor. 1956:

Newton Green 100 years ago, from Mr William White in his "History of Suffolk". Newton-near-Sudbury is described by him as a pleasant village, scattered around a green of 40 acres (now the golf course). The population in the year 1855 was 499 souls, it reached 561 in 1861, and then began to descend to its present figure of roughly 300. Earl Howe was Lord of the Manor of Newton in 1855 and Botelers belonged to the Causton family. Sackers Green is described as being 1 ¼ miles S.W. of the village, but as having already been enclosed.

40 YEARS AGO – Newton Newsletter edited by Frank Rowland. MAY 1976:

Newton Green Trust: An inaugural meeting of the Trustees was held on April 9th, when the broad policy in respect of the management of the Green was decided. This led to considerable discussion. As soon as several difficulties have been ironed out all Parishioners will be circulated with the Trustees' concept of Management of the Green which will be followed by a special Parish Assembly when all questions will be welcomed.

Parish Council: Mr R C Oliver has decided that after 30 years as a Parish Councillor the time has come for him to retire. The thanks of the whole village are extended to him for all the effort, hard work and fine service he has given for all this time. Thank you 'Roley', - we all appreciate it.

25 YEARS AGO – Newton Newsletter edited by Kathy Searles. MAY 1991:

Cancer Coffee Morning: We made a total of £277 and a cheque has been sent off to Cancer Research for £252 and a donation made to the Village Hall for£25. We thank everybody who made this such a good success, people who gave goods for sale and donations of raffle prizes. Also thanks to our willing helpers who always give their time to help, including Eileen who takes all our goods in her car, and of course, all the people who come and buy to support us. Monica and Elsie.

Parish Church Annual Meeting: In his first report to his parishioners Alex George expressed his gratitude for the welcome he had been given in the parish and expressed his thanks to Officers of the Church, especially the retiring Treasurer, Mr Philip Payne, and the retiring Churchwarden, Mrs Cicely Forrest.

CASTLE HEDINGHAM - THOUGHTS AND FANCIES

Castle Hedingham is a lovely English village in Essex, just beyond the Suffolk border. To get there from Sudbury you have to go up the long steep Ballingdon hill, leaving Sudbury, moving west.

The first time I went there was in November of 1955. I had met Edward Presley, a USAF man stationed at RAF Weathersfield, earlier that month. He invited me to have an evening meal

with him at the Bell Hotel on the main street of Castle Hedingham.

We had a mixed grill meal in the dimly lit dining room. The fireplace was aglow with embers from the wooden logs. Very romantic! We met Mr. Bragg, the landlord of the Bell, and had a drink with him in his private lounge.



Castle Hedingham would turn out to be a special landmark for me. It is a quaint old-fashioned village with timbered houses, somewhat like Lavenham, in Suffolk. Across the street from the Bell hotel was a very posh restaurant, at that time run by two brothers. Sometimes we would have a meal there on Sundays. They served a delicious mushroom soup, steak dinner and salad.

Edward and I met in early November 1955. We dated for a couple of months, and really enjoyed our time together. Edward was from Archer City, Texas, a place I had no idea of, or conception of its location. Edward was stationed at RAF Weathersfield, and he told me about the Thanksgiving special meal. He also brought me a sample of stuffed green olives, something I had never eaten before - very salty. Since liquor was cheap and easily obtained at the base PX, he bought a nice liquor called Southern Comfort. This was delicious, but also very strong.

I think at the time I didn't realize what I was getting into, dating an American, with all sorts of different cultures, traditions and culinary concoctions. But obviously I fell for it, and around Christmas time he asked me to marry him. He serenaded me with his guitar. At one time he had had a spot on KWFT radio as a guitar accompanist in Wichita Falls. For Christmas he gave me a lovely gold watch and a picture of himself - "To my beloved Edna"

My parents, especially my father, tried to talk me out of marrying Edward, but I was 22 and could make up my own mind. However, to marry an American serviceman entailed more than just a marriage license! Edward had to get permission from his commanding officer, and there was much paperwork required. I had to have an interview with the officer and the base chaplain. Everything was eventually approved.

Edward bought me a lovely diamond engagement ring from Hill's Jewelers in Friars Street, Sudbury - eighteen carat gold, and platinum with a lovely diamond. I still have it after all these years! We got married at Sudbury registrar's office by AWJ Hicks, the registrar. My mother and father were the witnesses, and also a Sgt Duncan, one of Edward's fellow airmen. This was on a Saturday, 28th January 1956. I bought my wedding cake from Andrews' bakery in Sudbury, next to Lloyds Bank, where I had worked for the last five years. My reception was held at what is now Barn Cottage in Newton Green.

I had a corsage of pink carnations and wore a lovely beige princess line coat and pink feathered hat. Edward wore his blue uniform and a black bow tie. We had a nice little party at Barn Cottage. All my family were there, and my Aunt Elsie and Aunt Gladys. Aunt Elsie brought me a bunch of blue violets. Our honeymoon was spent that weekend at the Bell Hotel in Castle Hedingham. It was very cold and snowing. The road was covered with ruts of ice. We managed to go to the cafe across the street for our meals.

Then it was back to work the next week, and time to find a cottage in Castle Hedingham. I also needed to sort out transportation to my job in Sudbury every morning. I knew a lady that worked at Cramphorn's on the market hill in Sudbury. She agreed to give me a ride

every morning, and Edward picked me up in the evening.

The first house we looked at was very small. It was situated across from the church in Castle Hedingham, semi-detached, next to an elderly couple. The cottage had one living room with a fireplace, a small kitchen and bathroom; only one bedroom upstairs. This was very cozy, and we bought some furniture from Stowe's Antique Shop in Sudbury. We had made arrangements with the landlord the week before we married, so things went smoothly. I had to use a gas cooker, something new for me because there was no gas supply at Newton Green.

That summer we had a lovely holiday in St. Albans and a tour of Scotland. We went to Holyrood house and Edinburgh castle, where we researched the Presley family.

Around that time, I decided to quit my job at Lloyds Bank. The transportation was becoming more of a problem, and Edward had many times an alert on base which required him to take off in the middle of the night or early morning, and stay there for several days. So, with




regret, I said goodbye to Lloyds Bank, and became a lady of my own discerning. This allowed me more time to visit my mother. I found a way to connect buses to get to Newton Green. Every Thursday afternoon I took a big red double decker bus that went around the little villages and ended up in Sudbury. Then I got on the Eastern Counties bus at I P.M. to go to Newton Green.

True to its name Castle Hedingham has a castle. A large Norman building, however, somewhat in disrepair at the top. Edward and I loved to visit it especially on Sundays in the Spring when the gardens were open. He carved our initials on one of the large trees. The castle inside was rather empty, but had a round table hanging on the wall, with the names of the knights engraved around it.



The church was another place we visited and explored, but seldom attended a service. There is a picture of an old lady with wild hair painted on the wall - supposedly painted by herself, after she was accused of being a witch. I don't know the rest of that story.

We decided to move to a larger house in 1957 after we learned one had become available at number 2 Church Ponds. This was on a street behind the church, and there was a pub at the end of Church Ponds. It was possible to walk through the churchyard from my house to the village stores on the main street.

There was also a butcher's shop on the main street, across from the restaurant; a typical English butcher's shop with meat hanging in the window, flies buzzing around and sawdust on the floor. I was able to buy lovely steaks and lamb chops there. Everything was very handy. The grocery store was just around the corner from St. Nicholas Church, and another variety store across from the pub at the end of Church Ponds. Another hardware store was situated at the east end of Church Ponds. They sold everything you needed for a kitchen, tea kettles, tea pots, brooms, china, dusters and polish. This store was run by a very pleasant elderly couple. They were always ready with help and advice.

Soon after the holiday in Scotland, I found out I was "en famille". Then began a series of doctor's visits and special health care concerns. However, there were no serious problem, and we now had a larger house.

My daughter Kathy was born at the USAF Wimpole Park Hospital in Arrington, near Cambridge. I had a long ride in an ambulance from Castle Hedingham to Arrington. This was on May 3rd, 1957. My mother was very excited at seeing her first grandchild. My father was rather shy and nonchalant. A first baby is a challenge for a new mother. There is so much work to do - making bottles of formula and washing diapers; plus, the lack of sleep at night.

From the front door of 2 Church Ponds there were two red-tiled steps leading into the foyer. Apparently the floor of the cottage had been lowered to make the ceiling seem higher. One night we had a very bad thunderstorm and a deluge of rain. Since Church Ponds Street was on a gradual slope, the water gushed around the top corner along a brick wall and flowed down the street at an amazing speed. The water started to come in the front door; we had a flood in our living room. I saw Mrs. Drury next door trying to keep the water out of her house with a large cooking board. The storm continued all night, with streak lightning and thunder!

The house on Church Ponds had a larger living room, but the fireplace was blocked up, so we had to use an electric heater. There was also a small dining room on the ground floor, where we put a large Westinghouse refrigerator. The kitchen had a gas stove, and a water heater. It was very damp in the kitchen, and mildew grew on the wall. One day I got an electric shock when I was trying to clean the wall. Someone had nailed an electric sheath to the wall, so the wall was electrified. It knocked me across the room!

Upstairs there were two bedrooms each with a window but no heat upstairs. At the bottom of the stairs there was a door, very fancy, made of paneled wood. It had a latch on the inside, and a wooden latch on the outside. One morning I got up after my husband had gone

to work and the stairs door was locked on the outside in the living room. What a pickle I was in! I don't remember how I got out of that predicament, but I must have found, maybe a long nail file, to open that door. Edward swore he did not accidentally or forgetfully close the latch. He said there must be a ghost in this house. He said he had seen its shadow several times! What a mystery!

Kathy was a happy baby. I had a lovely English pram for her, and often took her for walks around the village, on my way sometimes meeting with other new mothers.

English life can be so pleasant and beautiful. I had a lovely little garden in the back of the house. I grew marigolds and Canterbury bells.

One day my brother, Alan Vince, rode his bicycle to Castle Hedingham to do some garden work for me. He borrowed my neighbor, Mrs. Drury's, spade. Catastrophe! The spade was old, and the handle broke. We had to buy her a new spade!

Sometimes I would have afternoon tea with Mrs. Drury and her sister. Mrs. Drury's son owned the village garage. I often went round and lit her fire for her when she was working. We had a nice relationship.

I have many pictures of the backyard at number two Church Ponds. I had a long clothes line, which was always full of baby clothes. The small one car garage was at the end of the yard. We had a grey Austin car.

We lived at Church Ponds for a little over two years. Edward received a posting to Sheppard AFB, Texas. I had to get all kinds of paperwork and a visa to go to the United States, plus a visit to the Embassy in London.

In March of 1959 my sister, Sylvia Vince, married Robert Lee. I was matron of honor.

In July 1959 we packed up all our furniture, including my Rosewood piano, and the Air Force shipped it to Texas. We stayed with Sylvia and Bob at Palmer's Farm, Cockfield for a week, before leaving for the U.S. We boarded a military plane at RAF Mildenhall. It was a very sad day. My parents were very upset. Kathy was a little over two years old, so that was a sad goodbye for my mother.

Maybe someday I will see Castle Hedingham again. Such a lovely place to begin married life. Now it is a pleasant memory.

But was that house really haunted? I don't think so. Just Edward's imagination working overtime.

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
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
