Guidance for golf on the green at Newton

Upon registering annually with the club and booking in at the professional's shop before play, residents of the village can enjoy nine holes free golf on the village green. All guests must pay a green fee. An extra nine holes on the private side of the course can be played after paying the appropriate fee at the club shop.

Villager-Plus Membership

To enjoy regular, 18-hole golf, residents can take out Villager-Plus membership of the club, which involves paying half the normal full, seven-day fee (£377.50 in 2017-18). Subject to the guidance of the professional's shop, play will be available daily from 10.30 am, and 12.30 pm on Saturdays. A condition of Villager Plus membership involves a free, one-hour, introductory session with the club professional.

The club operates with a full, open licence, and facilities are available for private hire, with many social functions open to village residents

18/001 Apologies for Absence

Apologies received from Cllr Rita Schwenk and Cllr James Finch (Suffolk County Council).

18/002 Declaration of Interests and Requests for Dispensation

Cllr Parker declared a non-pecuniary interest (8A) and Cllr Taylor declared a pecuniary interest (7A). No requests for dispensation had been received.

18/003 Minutes of meeting held on the 13th December 2017

The minutes of the meeting which Cllr Presland had previously circulated were approved as a true record.

18/004 Public Forum

- a) It was bought to the Council's attention that the footpath from Church Road to the Allotments was in poor condition as previously recorded (17/168A). Also, that a tree may cause damage to the overhead lines. This will be investigated by Cllr Presland and progress will be reported at the next meeting on 14/02/18.
- b) It was bought to the Council's attention that the path adjacent to the Vaughan and Blythe building site, Sudbury Road was covered in mud and was causing and an obstruction to the public. This will be investigated by Cllr Presland and progress will be reported at the next meeting on 14/02/18.
- c) A village landowner made the Councillors aware that, in the very near future, he intends to put in a planning application to BDC to build 9 houses in Newton. This was not on agenda and so, when the NPC receives the planning application it will be then become an agenda item for discussion.

18/005 Babergh District Council

Cllr Parker gave an up-date on the recent elections. Cllr Ward, of the Conservative Group was elected as leader of Babergh District Council. The election was held following the resignation of former Leader Cllr Jennie Jenkins. Cllr Ward plans to have a referendum regarding the relationship between Babergh and Mid-Suffolk Councils. More details to follow

Extracts from Parish Magazines from the past Compiled by Alan Vince – Village Historian

60 YEARS AGO – Newton Newsleaf produced by Rev A G Ensor. FEBRUARY 1958:

The Fireside Club: The House to House collection raised £2-13s. Half of this is returned directly to the Club. The Club is flourishing and there is plenty of room for more members. It should be understood that all benefits of the Welfare Association are available to the 'Over Sixties' even if they are not members of the local club. The Club itself is in fact one of the benefits. Anyone needing advice or help of any kind should get in touch with a member of the Committee. The Cornard Club has invited some of our members to their birthday party on March 25th. A.G.E.

40 YEARS AGO - Newton Newsletter edited by Frank Rowland FEBRUARY 1978:

Editor's Comments: Most of you will know that Frank Rowland, who has done such a marvellous job with our Village Newsletter since it started in its new format, has had a bad time healthwise of late. He has asked me therefore to fill this gap temporarily which I shall endeavour to do, although I lack the ability to give the editorial the delightfully breezy style which always characterises Frank's contributions.

25 YEARS AGO – Newton Newsletter edited by Kathy Searles FEBRUARY 1993:

Panto with a Difference: This year Newton's writer and producer Kathleen Searles, has broken all tradition by putting on as her 20th performance one that is not one of the standard pantomime stories. The play opened with a brilliant colourful scene of the Market Place with a canal in front and a splendid barge in the capable hands of the captain (Nancy Harries) and the ship's boy (Martin Schwenk), making its slow way across the stage. The Market stalls are in the charge of Madame Sesame (Norah Millyard) and Madame Bun (Joyce Burn). On the cheese stall Jean Adams is assisted by her son Paul (Andrew Crysell), and two cows Milly-Moo and Mandy-Moo (Molly Watson and Barbara Birchenough). A delightful little dance by four children, Sarah Garman, Lisa Schwenk, Amy and Melanie Warner, escorted by Mark Warner, gets the show off to a good start. The story revolves round the Royal Family; the King (Jean Russell) and Queen (Jean Green) do not know what to do with their daughter (Angela Crysell) who will never smile despite the efforts of her ladies-in -waiting (Michelle and Kirsty Payne). However, thanks to the magic of the Golden Goose (Wendy Turner) the problem is solved. A handsome young man, Simon, (Lara Murphy) is an eager suitor but has first to escape from his Aunts, Lucy and Lettie (Margaret Chaplin and Maxine Canvin). The pantomime is set amongst the tulips, windmills and canals of Holland. These together with the magic influence of the Tulip Fairy (Joan Bell) and the Golden Goose bring the story to the proverbial happy end. Great credit is due to Harry Searles and John Turner for the splendid stage effects and to Betty Britten for the piano accompaniment. Gaspard Willis.


