We called out " God speed the Plough ". We also thought of the cutting of our own life's furrow in this new year. Revd. Judith Blessed the Plough and us by sprinkling water with a sprig of Rosemary, signifying remembrance.



Going back to the Chancel we saw another reminder of ploughing, as there were two bright horse brasses on the Altar and photos of a ploughing match when the brasses were seen on the big Shire horses. Revd. Judith celebrated Holy Communion and she was assisted by our amazing Jean Adams. Thank you to Nancy Roser for playing the organ and to all who worked as a great team in preparing the service and afterwards - as a number of our members were away.

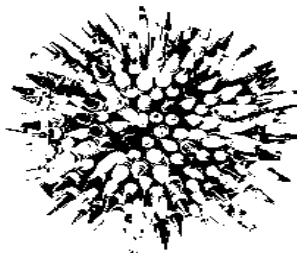

All guests must pay a green fee. An extra nine holes on the private side of the course can be played after paying the appropriate fee at the club shop.

Villager-Plus Membership

To enjoy regular, 18-hole golf, residents can take out Villager-Plus membership of the club, which involves paying half the normal full, seven-day fee (£377.50 in 2017-18). Subject to the guidance of the professional's shop, play will be available daily from 10.30 am, and 12.30 pm on Saturdays. A condition of Villager Plus membership involves a free, one-hour, introductory session with the club professional.

Apologies received from Cllr Lee Parker (Babergh District Council) and Cllr James Finch (Suffolk County Council).

18/017 Declaration of Interests and Requests for Dispensation

No requests for dispensation or declaration of interests have been received.

18/018 Minutes of meeting held on the 10th January 2018

The minutes of the meeting which had previously been circulated were approved as a true record and signed by the chairman.

18/019 Public Forum

A member of the public brought to the NPC's attention that he intended to make a planning application on Marks Meadow in Rectory Road. The application will be reviewed at the next meeting.

18/020 Clerks Report

- a) Register of Interests forms to be re-sent to councillors.
- b) Hastoe has confirmed that their application for affordable housing is proceeding slowly. Clerk to update NPC at the next meeting.
- c) Babergh & Mid-Suffolk have produced a preliminary consultation: "One Council For The Heart Of Suffolk" to promote the amalgamation of the two councils. Further information is expected.
- d) Suffolk Highways wish to allow the local community to take responsibility for repairs around Newton. Clerk to contact Suffolk Highways to see how we can cooperate.
- e) A special tribute is planned for 11th November as it is the 100th anniversary of the end of the First World War. More information to follow.

Clerk to update the Asset Register. Insurance not due for renewal until September 2018.

MARCH 1958:

Newton Green Women's Institute:

The March W.I. meeting was well attended. Mrs Milner, President, welcomed two new members; Mrs Cameron and Mrs Wright-Anderson. Mrs Marshall was awarded her Proficiency Bar for the rug she exhibited last year.

A resolution was suggested by Mrs Milner for the world disarmament of nuclear war weapons. Mrs Ord suggested that all women should band together supporting this resolution and so help to bring about world peace.

25 YEARS AGO – Newton Newsletter edited by Kathy Searles

MARCH 1993:

Annual Fete: For many years the Fete has been organised by the W.I., but this year it has been decided that it should become a Village Fete. A meeting was held and was attended by representatives from the Men's Golf, Women's Golf, the Cricket Club, the Fireside Club, the Village Hall Committee, the Parish Council, the Parish Church, Newton Green Trust, the Plampin/Alston Charities, and others, and there was considerable enthusiasm and many ideas for greatly enlarged Village Fete. There would be children's sports and possibly some races for adults. Teas would be provided by the W.I., many more sideshows, a mammoth raffle, a bouncy castle, more stalls and possibly a barbeque in the early evening. It was agreed that all stalls, sideshows etc., would give half of the profits to the Village Hall and retain the other half.

Mrs Jessie Pilgrim: With sadness I write of Jessie Pilgrim – she was a very special person and had the rare quality of being able to talk to anyone. In spite of her infirmities, she enjoyed her life and her familiar figure in her wheelchair was always seen at the village coffee mornings. She was one of the most generous people I have known. *M. Chaplin*

I am sure all who knew Jessie will be saddened at her death and our sympathy will go out to her family. Jessie's home was in Cornard and, many years ago, she came to live in Newton after she married. Many will remember Jessie for her kindness and patience during her long illness. My memory of Jessie goes back many years, when I first saw her sitting in my infants' class at Great Cornard school, a little, plump, fair headed girl with a lovely smile. *N. Millyard*

Mr Ernie Addison: Ernie came to Newton on the day that war broke out. His searchlight unit of the City of London Territorial Ack Ack Division was set up on the site of the present Airey Houses. While in Newton he met Violet, married her and after the war, they lived on the very same spot. In 1942 Ernie volunteered to serve in gliders and was in the Normandy Landings and the crossing of the Rhine. Ernie drove H.G.V. vehicles – including work for Copella, and for a few years, London buses. But his main interest was in the reunions of the Airborne Forces. He attended these regularly and went back to Arnhem nearly every year. He was very pleased recently when he was rung up in hospital by the Dutch people with whom he used to stay. All his friends at the Village whist drives were delighted when, although already very ill, Ernie won 1st prize at the Christmas Drive. We shall all miss him very much. *John Beavis*

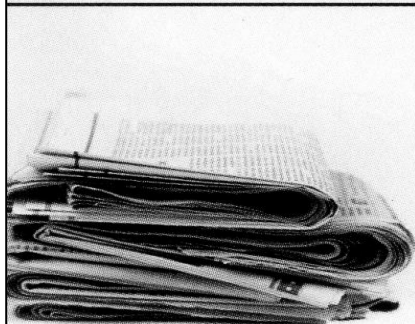

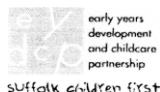
