#### **HARRY BUCKLEDEE**

I think I should start by saying how lucky we are to have had Harry living in Newton. It has been a great pleasure to have known him. Ever since his arrival here sometime in the 60's, Harry has been involved in and contributed to just about every organisation in the village. Above all, I think you could always rely on Harry to be very fair in all his negotiations and the decisions he was involved in over the years. He was a good speaker and was never afraid to voice his opinion. His views were almost always very sensible and usually in line with what people wanted. He was never phased or intimidated by confrontation; his quiet sensible approach usually came good.

Harry achieved much in the Village and the results of his efforts are there for all to see. He designed many gardens notably at The Old Rectory and at The Deans; he designed and oversaw the creation of the Jubilee Gardens and carried out the maintenance of it for many years, cutting the grass and hedges and managing the various shrubs and trees, all of which he had originally selected. For many years he maintained the gardens around the War Memorial and the Village Sign. A large number of the trees on the green were planted and maintained by Harry and I think he even planted a couple of trees which were presented to him in recognition of his many years of service to the Parish Council and Newton Green Trust. Those trees will be there for many years with their plaques to remind us of all he did for the village. Perhaps the most fitting tribute to him is the wonderful show of daffodils on the green this year. Harry planted those and they will appear every year as a tribute to him.

Harry was brought up in Lindsey but it was our gain when he came to live in Newton. He had a difficult time during the second world war; many of you will have read his book



entitled 'For you the War is over'. For him it was far from over. Life as a POW would not have been easy but perhaps the most difficult time for him was the Long March to Freedom which was referred to in his book and which was made into a TV programme in which Harry appeared. He spoke of his experiences at that time, and he looked so smart and presentable on the TV wearing his medals.

Harry was a great supporter of the British Legion. For years the money raised from his sale of poppies was the best in the area, and he always ensured there was a poppy wreath on the War Memorial when he made his speech on Remembrance Sunday.

Harry coped on his own for several years before going into St Joseph's Care Home about a year ago. He was happy there and enjoyed the occasions when Rod, Barry, Arthur and I went there to have lunch with him.

Whilst there he also published his second book about his early life in Lindsey. Happy memories, and I am proud to have been among his friends.



Newton was lucky to have him and should also be very proud of him.



## Guidance for golf on the green at Newton

Upon registering annually with the club and booking in at the professional's shop before play, residents of the village can enjoy nine holes free golf on the village green. All guests must pay a green fee. An extra nine holes on the private side of the course can be played after paying the appropriate fee at the club shop.

### Villager-Plus Membership

To enjoy regular, 18-hole golf, residents can take out Villager-Plus membership of the club, which involves paying half the normal full, seven-day fee (£377.50 in 2017-18). Subject to the guidance of the professional's shop, play will be available daily from 10.30 am, and 12.30 pm on Saturdays. A condition of Villager Plus membership involves a free, one-hour, introductory session with the club professional.

Cllr James Finch (Suffolk County Council) reported that Nicola Beach was the new Chief Executive for Suffolk County Council.

Suffolk Highways - The volume of reports (regarding potholes) coming into the team remains high with reports during February and March reaching approximately 5,000 per month.

Better Broadband for Suffolk Update - The Council's aim is still to reach 100% of Suffolk premises with superfast broadband. We have contractual plans in place to increase coverage to 98% of Suffolk premises during 2020. I am now working with officers and partner organisations to find solutions how to close the final 2%. To do this I do need to know those of you who have still not be been able to receive an acceptable broadband speed for your needs. Most of these in my division are in the more outlying properties. Please let me and your Parish Clerk know.

# 60 YEARS AGO – Newton Newsleaf produced by Rev A G Ensor. SUMMER1958:

# 40 YEARS AGO - Newton Newsletter edited by Frank Rowland MAY 1978:

**Recreation Field:** The most important news item must be the Tribunal on the Compulsory Purchase Order on the Recreation Field. One thing clearly emerged from this Tribunal business, that is the tremendous loyalty and pride all of Newton feels in its Village and all that appertains to it. The turnout at the Hall and the enthusiasm was tremendous – well done all of you! F.R.

The Village Hall was completely full for this Tribunal hearing, and tribute must be paid to the very fine points put forward by all our representatives and the clear and lucid manner in which they made these points felt. In order of speakers they were: Mr R.C.Oliver, Mr John Webb, Mr John Beevis, Mrs Veronica Ashford, Mrs Barbara Carter, Mrs Norah Millyard, Mr Charles Parkinson, Wing Comm. Fitz-Gerald Lombard and Mr John Taylor. The Tribunal could not have failed to be impressed by their honesty and sincerity, and whatever the outcome on June 19<sup>th</sup>, it is pleasant to report that Newton emerged from the enquiry with enthusiasm and dignity.

**At Rest:** Mrs Joan Bartlett was buried in Newton Churchyard on 3<sup>rd</sup> April. We extend our sincere sympathy to Mr Bartlett and his daughters at this time. Joan died at the early age of 41 after a long illness very bravely born. She died peacefully in hospital on March 25<sup>th</sup>. R.I.P. Ernie wishes to give sincere thanks for all the marvellous help and support which he has received from so many people.

# 25 YEARS AGO – Newton Newsletter edited by Kathy Searles MAY 1993:

Annual Parish Meeting: In his report on the work of the Parish Council, the chairman, John Taylor, referred to the deaths of three long-established residents of the village, Mr Arthur Davey, Mr Roland Oliver and Mr Harry Vince, all of whom had played a distinctive part in the life of the village. The ponds on the Green had had filled with the recent rains and Janet Weavers was thanked for her sterling work in organising the clearance and the financing of the work. It was hoped that the few remaining ponds would be cleared as soon as possible. Mr Taylor thanked Harry Buckledee for his maintenance of the attractive Jubilee Gardens; Lionel Humm for his work in keeping tidy and appealing the garden around the War Memorial which had recently been refurbished; Judy Donnelly for her organisation of the Neighbourhood Watch scheme; Kathy Searles for producing the monthly newsletter, and Harry Buckledee for planting, on his own, over 500 trees at the corner of the playing field to form a future thicket.

**Gardening in May:** Try a scented border near the house or patio. A mixture of plants like Nicotiana, Migonette, Night-scented Stock, Evening Primrose, all have delightful scents, especially on a warm evening. Other plants that can be used are Sweet Rocket, Sweet Sultan and Sweet Peas. Shrubby plants like Rosemary and Lavender help to give good results.

Runner Beans and French Beans can now be sown outside. By the time they come through the danger of frost should be fairly remote. Indoor raised plants should be hardened off as much as possible and planting out delayed until the end of the month. Harry Buckledee
