

ARTHUR ADAMS

Arthur died aged 93 on 1^{st} September and we said goodbye to him at Bury St Edmunds crematorium on Wednesday 3^{rd} October.

Arthur was born in London in 1925, and spent his childhood years getting up to the usual boyish mischief. He was only 14 when World War II broke out, but even so he helped the firewatchers by running messages and did some fire watching.

Arthur's lifelong interest was in electricity. He joined the Fleet Air Arm in 1943 and specialised in aircraft electrics. In the 1950's he set up his own business, met Jean and they were married in 1954, living firstly in Leytonstone and then moving to Billericay in 1956. Arthur's business was going well and Jean was working in sales in the local electricity shop – as she later did in Sudbury. They moved to Newton Green in 1977 and soon became involved in village life, making many friends. They attended the church and enjoyed many social events in the village hall, particularly the pantomimes where Arthur helped backstage while Jean took part in the productions. Arthur's work was much in demand, but he found time to completely rewire the village hall, entirely voluntarily; he absolutely refused to accept any payment. Recently the wiring in the village hall had to be inspected to comply with regulations, and the contractor commented that it was one of the best installations he had ever seen in a public building. Arthur was pleased (but not surprised) when I told him this!

In recent years Arthur joined us in the 'Last of the Summer Wine' lunch gathering at the Saracen's Head on Thursdays. He very much enjoyed these occasions, as he did when we went to visit and have lunch with Harry Buckledee at St Joseph's in Sudbury.

Arthur was a very pleasant person to be with, and always had a smile on his face. He will be fondly remembered by his friends in the village.

BIER


June 1921

A fund has been running for some time to provide the parish with a wheeled hearse (bier). An order was placed with a local firm but owing to war restrictions it has only recently been possible to execute this work.

The hearse is now available for use at a charge of 5/- (25pence now) on each occasion, to parishioners, deducting from this amount any donation that has already been made to the fund, on the first occasion of its use by the original subscriber. The cost of the hearse (£31.00) has been placed on the Parish Fund account, and towards this sum £5-16-5 has been received, the amount collected when the purchase of the hearse was first suggested. Further subscriptions are now invited. **From village newsletters June 1921.**

IT'S ALL SO LONG AGO Extracts from Parish Magazines from the past Compiled by Alan Vince – Village Historian

60 YEARS AGO – Newton Newsleaf produced by Rev A G Ensor. NOVEMBER 1958:

Church Flowers and care of Church: Most of the work connected with the care of the Church including the obtaining and arranging of flowers falls on one or two people. They would greatly appreciate some help. Perhaps this is a job <u>you</u> would like to do. Would someone also volunteer to help with the younger children. This can be a full-time job in itself for a keen person who is fond of children.

Baptisms: On the 17th of August Lesley Jane, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. Hills and Susan June, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E.J Joslin.

The Fireside Club: The outing to Clacton was enjoyed by all. The weather in the morning was very unfavourable and the rain fell heavily, At Clacton it was really warm & the sun shone. Many thanks to Mrs Bean & others who helped to make the arrangements.

40 YEARS AGO - Newton Newsletter edited by Frank Rowland NOVEMBER 1978:

Accident: Once again a tragedy has struck our small community, with the loss of Mrs Cundy in a tragic road accident. This has, once again, brought up the old demands for some sort of safety precaution through the village, and the W.I, with the able assistance of Mr and Mrs Rufus, plus many willing helpers, are organising a petition. After over 20 years of continuous pressure on the Authorities, with no result, is there any chance of some action at last?


Mrs. Romola Cundy: I think everyone in the village was shocked by the death of Mrs Cundy, even if many newcomers hardly knew her. I remember the family coming to live in the Leys Farm many years ago when I was about 12. With her three sisters she helped her father on the farm, while Dulcie, who was not very strong, stayed with her mother. I remember them going to Church every Sunday, and I thought she worked dreadfully hard, but it was a life she loved, and, later on, when her parents left Newton, she and her sister Margaret stayed on at Goldings and kept cows. Later she married Mr Alexander Cundy, a farmer, and lived for a time at 'The Elms', and then for many years at 'The Homestead' in Cornard Tye. After her mother's death, Dulcie came to live with her. After Mr Cundy's death, she and Dulcie returned to Newton and lived in Long Gardens, where she took a great delight in her garden, and she told me many times that she loved Newton, and in a most unobtrusive way she did many little kindnesses for people, especially in illness. We shall all miss her familiar figure around the village.

The War Memorial: A very special word of appreciation for Mr Arthur Davey's tireless work on keeping our War Memorial looking spotless for the service on the 12th. Arthur himself took part in the infamous Battle of the Somme, also Vimy Ridge, Deauville Wood and other notorious places. **F.R.**

25 YEARS AGO – Newton Newsletter edited by Kathy Searles NOVEMBER 1993:

New Bus Service: Commencing on Wednesday 3rd November, a new bus service will operate from Sudbury to Colchester five days a week. Hedingham Omnibus Service 84 will serve all the outlying villages, including Stoke-by-Nayland, and certain ones to the General Hospital, Turner Road. Hopefully towards the end of November, a new bus, which will have a ramp for the disabled, will be in service. The cost has not yet been settled but will be about £1.25 single. There will be the usual concessionary fares.

Neighbourhood Watch: As winter approaches and nights become longer, we should all be extra vigilant, being aware that unfortunately we all become a little more vulnerable to the con men and the burglar. National statistics show that a burglary occurs every 40 seconds. One home in 20 is burgled each year. Suffolk figures show a rise of 56% in burglaries over the past three years. When was the last time you checked the garden shed? Is it locked? Are lawn mowers, bicycles and other items such as golf clubs marked? What about car watch and car security? Fact File on cars – only 55% of car drivers always lock their vehicles. One car is stolen in Britain every two minutes. A quarter of cars stolen are never recovered by their owners. **Judy Donnelly**




