25th November: Our Service of Holy Communion was taken by Revd. Elke Cattermole who is from St. Peter and St. Paul in Lavenham. We had a special service to remember one of the men from the First World War who did come back to his wife Mary in Newton but died two weeks later in the Belle View hospital in Sudbury on the 11th December 1918 at the age of 33years.

He had suffered greatly while a prisoner of war and he is buried in the War Grave in our churchyard. Rufus, Revd. Judith husband has researched meticulously the history of

Private Fredrick Elijah Smith and this was read at the beginning of the service by one of the congregation. Revd. Elke included Fredrick in her sermon and prayers. We had photos on the Altar of his history notes and his War Grave which is one of 1,332 such graves in Suffolk cared for by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission for perpetuity.

We were delighted to welcome Revd. Elke and her husband to our refreshment time, giving us a chance to chat with them and for them both to meet people from other churches that had joined us. We hope that Revd. Elke will be able to join us again at All Saints' if at all possible.

Thank you to Nancy Roser for playing the organ and to everyone who helped to make this service special.

8th December: On Saturday All Saints' Church held the Annual Christmas Coffee Morning in the Village Hall.

Following a night of wind and rain we were so pleased to see the sunshine for our event. We were delighted to see people from the Boxford and Little Waldingfield churches joining us. The stalls holders were busy with excited customers and the Raffle, with great prizes on offer, kept two people busy dealing with the tickets. The refreshment ladies were quick to supply hot drinks, biscuits and a smile for everyone.

We really appreciated all the work that took place before the event, the persons in charge of the stalls, the refreshment ladies and those clearing up afterwards. Thank you to all involved. A special THANK YOU to all who attended and who created a happy atmosphere and gave generously at the event. We look forwards to seeing you here next year.

16th December: After a very bitterly, cold windy Saturday we were blessed with a sunny calm Sunday for Our Annual Candle Lit Festival of Carols and Readings. Outside a Christmas tree and church bells greeted the people. The whole church looked beautiful with masses of candles, fairy lights and greenery. From the Nave we could see in the Chancel the large Christmas tree with its twinkling lights and decorations. It was very kindly donated by Gordon Kennet. We were joined for the third Christmas by the Millwheel Singers. They sang a motet ' O Radiant Dawn ' from the back of the Nave and their voices sounded so beautiful. After words of welcome and a Bidding Prayer, for the third year, nine-year-old William Lowe sang the solo verse of Once in Royal David's City from the back of the Nave. A programme of traditional readings and poems relating to Christmas time were read by members of our church or visiting friends including fifteen year old Ben Lowe. The Millwheel Singers sang songs in keeping with the readings plus leading us in the familiar carols and with the amazing acoustics of the Nave making a very uplifting Service. After the Collect for Christmas and the Blessing we had a rousing rendition of We Wish You A Merry Christmas. Going out of the cold Nave, everyone was happy to move into the warm Chancel for mulled wine and mince pies. There was a very happy atmosphere as we all mingled and chatted. A HUGE ' Thank You ' to all who came to join us.

24th December: Our Crib Service was taken by Revd. Gerald Drew. He welcomed us and spoke about the various types of cribs used throughout history, which was interesting. Revd. Drew mentioned the four sets of

figures that we had in church all different. One set had been knitted, one presented in memory of Linda Cutts, a type of terracotta set and the main one in the large Crib in front of the Altar. After the service Revd.Drew gave everyone a post card with the Crib scene on one side and the message of the Crib that the Saviour is born for you and me. A home-made biscuit with a red ribbon to hang on a Christmas Tree was given to adults and the one child there. Sadly, one family could not be there as the nine-year-old who was going to read at the service had an infection resulting in a perforated ear drum. He was so disappointed, having learnt the words off by heart. A special thank you to Revd. Drew and his wife Jane for being with us. Thank you to Nancy Roser for playing the organ especially at this busy time. A big 'Thank You' to all who came to our Crib Service. 2019 is here and first church service is on the 27th January and taken by Roy Tricker as the Plough Sunday. This date is the nearest we could be to the actual Plough Sunday date at the beginning of the month. We are fortunate to have an actual Plough in the church and it will be part of the service.

To enjoy regular, 18-hole golf, residents can take out Villager-Plus membership of the club, which involves paying half the normal full, seven-day fee (£377.50 in 2017-18). Subject to the guidance of the professional's shop, play will be available daily from 10.30 am, and 12.30 pm on Saturdays. A condition of Villager Plus membership involves a free, one-hour, introductory session with the club professional.

NEWTON'S NEW CATERER WANTS TO DEVELOP CLUB'S POTENTIAL

Newton Green Golf Club's caterer Jake Boughtwood believes his new job with the club can provide a tasty and rewarding experience for both the members and himself.

At the age of 29, he sees his new challenge as catering franchiser as an important career move, giving him the experience to branch out on his own.

Jake says he is eager to fulfil the wishes of the members, who have given him a very warm welcome. He looks forwards to hearing from anyone wishing to use the club for private hiring, including parties, receptions, christenings and even weddings for members, villagers or the general public.

Working at the club previously as a freelance, he was able to view future prospects, and explained: "I think the facilities provide the potential for a successful venture, and during the few weeks I worked at the club over the last year I was particularly impressed with the warm atmosphere, including that generated by staff and the members.

"The club has two good rooms, each capable of providing a good atmosphere for individual functions, and although the kitchen is not the largest, I have successfully worked in smaller spaces.

"With the addition of the marquee in the summer, the set-up has the potential to do well, and I am eager to hear from people who have ideas, or wish to use the facilities for their own events."

Jake says he prefers "good home cooking," and early events he has been involved in have shown he has a flair for providing tasty fayre.

After leaving school, Jake qualified as a professional caterer at Colchester Institute, and then spent two years as a sous chef working under a head chef at the busy Victory restaurant at Mersea Island.

60 YEARS AGO – Newton Newsleaf produced by Rev A G Ensor.

JANUARY 1959:

Dear Friends: A Happy New Year to you all. I hope it will be a year of peace, prosperity, health and happiness to each and all of us. The Christmas season passed off fairly quietly in Newton. The Christmas services were fairly well attended and the Church was beautifully decorated as usual thanks to the faithful few. The collections on Christmas Day amounted to £3.5s.0d. Although carol singing seems to be one of those things which are on the decline, parties of carol singers both from the Church and the Chapel went round the village proclaiming the great message of Christmas in song. The amount collected for the Restoration Fund by the Church carol singers amounted to over £7. Many thanks to those who sang and to those who gave. I hope that in spite of Television and attempts to land on the Moon there will continue to be carol singers as Christmas would not be quite the same without them.

19/01 Apologies for Absence

Cllr. Phil Taylor sent his apology.

19/02 Declaration of Interests and Requests for Dispensation

19/03 Minutes of meeting held on the 12th December 2018

The minutes of the meeting were approved by the councillors and signed by the Chairman as a correct record.

19/04 Public Forum

Cllr. Lee Parker (Babergh District Council) provided a report. Items covered included:

- a. A full budget meeting is planned for January 2019. So there will be more information at the next NPC meeting.
- b. Contrary to media reports, there are no plans to introduce parking charges in Sudbury

Cllr. James Finch (Suffolk County Council) provided a report. Items covered included:

- a. Options assessment report for Sudbury traffic congestion relief scheme has now been published.
- b. Citizens Advice (CAB) grant funding to be reduced by half by 2019/20 before ending in 2020/21.
- c. A report published in December 2018 shows sport and physical activity are worth £270m to the Suffolk economy.
- d. 900 children are in care in Suffolk! An article on the subject will go into the February edition of the Box River News. Also; a "drop in session" in Boxford is planned to allow for a one to one discussion with a member of the SCC Specialist team. This will be at St Mary's House on Monday 11th March 7.30 - 9.30pm.
- e. There are on-going problems with Broadband in Newton. Please let the Clerk know your name and landline phone number; if you can receive superfast broadband, but have not been connected

19/05 Hastoe Update

Community Allotment Scheme

After a presentation from the Community Allotment Group. - a. The Councillors reviewed the expenditure budget and proposed reserves (See Appendix) and resolved to set a Precept of £10,258 for 2019 / 2020.
- b. The councillors noted the income received since the last meeting, agreed the Reconciliation of Accounts against the Bank Statements and reviewed the Statement of Accounts against the budget.
- c. All cheques signed and due for signing, as itemised in the RFO Report (See Appendix), were authorised by the councillors.

19/11 Defibrillator

The councillors reviewed the options for a defibrillator to be placed on the outside of the Village Hall. The preferred option was that provided by Community Heartbeat trust at a cost of £1860.00 . This will be voted on at February's Meeting. In the meantime the Clerk will clarify details of installation and contact James Finch about possible funding.

19/12 Risk Assessment

The councillors reviewed CPC's Risk Management Register (Appendix) as at January 2019 and were satisfied with the issues covered. An entry for GDPR will be reviewed at the next meeting.

19/13 Effectiveness of CPC's Internal Audit and Internal Control process

The councillors reviewed the current system of NPC's internal controls and internal audit and resolved that they were satisfied with the measures currently undertaken by the council.

19/14 Newton Charities

The Councillors reviewed the request from the Trustees of The Newton Charities and agreed to appoint a Janet Taylor as a new Trustee.

19/16 Footpaths

The Councillors agreed to investigate the possibility of claiming an historic foot path to the south of Assington Road. Cllr. Schwenk to contact the landowner and the Clerk to contact Open Spaces Society / Suffolk County Council.

19/17 Reports

- a. Newton Trust – Trees have been trimmed and ditch cleaned along A134/Marshalls Field.
- b. Newton Village Hall – There has been no meeting, so nothing to report.
- c. NNPT – A coffee morning, including a presentation on progress made, is to be held at the Village Hall on Saturday 26th January.

Cllr. Bower requested that NPC donate to the Christmas Parcels appeal. This will be considered at the next meeting.

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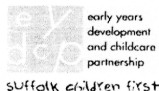
