Upon registering annually with the club and booking in at the professional's shop before play, residents of the village can enjoy nine holes free golf on the village green. All guests must pay a green fee. An extra nine holes on the private side of the course can be played after paying the appropriate fee at the club shop.

Villager-Plus Membership

To enjoy regular, 18-hole golf, residents can take out Villager-Plus membership of the club, which involves paying half the normal full, seven-day fee (£377.50 in 2017-18). Subject to the guidance of the professional's shop, play will be available daily from 10.30 am, and 12.30 pm on Saturdays. A condition of Villager Plus membership involves a free, one-hour, introductory session with the club professional.

IT'S ALL SO LONG AGO

Extracts from Parish Magazines from the past Compiled by Alan Vince – Village Historian

60 YEARS AGO – Newton Newsleaf produced by Rev A G Ensor JULY 1959:

Fete: The fete was a great success. The day was fine and everyone enjoyed themselves. The sum raised was a satisfactory £59 Thanks to all who came to spend and to help, although I know that all who participated in any way enjoyed doing so. In open the fete Miss Stella Smith expressed her affection for Newton and spoke of her family's long association with the parish. As I pointed out at the fete, the responsibility of keeping the Parish Church standing is a moral, if not a legal one which falls upon all the people who live in the parish. One of the greatest things a parish priest can have is the goodwill of the people he tries to serve.

Fireside Club: We all enjoyed our outing to Harwich and Dovercourt on July 6th. 40 YEARS AGO - Newton Newsletter edited by Frank Rowland

JULY 1979:

Best Kept Village:

At the very first time Newton entered we have actually come second in the Babergh section, even beating Kersey. We actually got 89% and it reflects the great credit on all the hard work which was put in by everybody. The immaculate appearance of the Green itself . the beautifully clipped hedges and the lovely gardens — the result of so much hard work, to say nothing of the blisters and aching backs! We now go on to the next round which embraces the whole of Suffolk.

Future Events: Only nine people were at the village hall recently to hear representatives of Babergh District Council tell us about the plans for future development, not only of Newton Green, but of surrounding areas and Sudbury. The best news is that all development in Newton is most strictly limited; it is possible there may be infilling on already developed sites, while the green itself has been designated an area of Special Scientific Interest, and will remain untouched.

Church News: At the PCC meeting on June 6th we heard, with regret, that the Rector and Mrs Grieve would be leaving us to take up another living in Scotland in September. Although they have been here only a short time, we as a village, will miss them.

19/058 Apologies for Absence

Cllr. Schwenk sent her apologies.

19/059 Declaration of Interests and Requests for Dispensation

None.

19/060 Minutes of meeting held on the 13th March 2019

Minute 19/046 was incorrect as NPC no longer qualify for the General Power of Competence. This was revised accordingly. Minute 19/39 should read 19/07. Also: under Minute 19/39 it should read *Cllr. Bower requested the installation of speed limiting signs*. The revised minutes of the meeting were then approved by the councillors and signed by the Chairman as a correct record.

19/061 Public Forum

a. Clir. Parker (Babergh District Council) confirmed his new ward covered not only Newton, but Leavenheath; Assington; and Little Cornard. He was also on the Planning Committee and Cabinet member for Customers, Digital Transformation & Improvement. All future Babergh Council Meetings will be streamed on U-tube. The case of escaping livestock was under investigation.

Cllr. Parker also reminded NPC that planning for the forthcoming Firework display in November should be on next month's agenda.

- b. Cllr. Finch (Suffolk County Council) provided a report. Items covered included:
 - Suffolk County Council's AGM 5 New Policy Priorities: New council houses; Cut carbon
 emissions; Work more collaboratively with councils and public service partners; A long term
 vision for growing Suffolk's economy; and the Council to act more commercially.
 - · Offsted confirms SCC's Children's Services are 'Outstanding'.
 - New Highways Self Help Scheme empowers local councils to do more in their community.
 - Fostering and Adoption Previous meetings have been well attended and it is hoped some
 will progress to become foster carers. There will be further "one to one drop in sessions":
 Mary's House, Swan Street, Boxford Thursday 6th June 19.30 21.30; and The
 Garrard Room at the Bures Community Centre 24th June 1930 21.30.
 - Broadband in Newton. Please let the Clerk know your name, address and landline phone number; if you still cannot receive superfast broadband.
- c. NPC heard a presentation from the Newton Gardening Group. They hope to have an open evening in July. The members attend the allotments as time allows, but they aim to meet each Sunday. Also, NPC agreed to re-imburse the group for equipment purchased as previously agreed.
- d. NPC heard a presentation from Helen DeRoy regarding an event to celebrate VE Day Friday 8 May 2020. More details to follow. Next year's Early May Bank Holiday will be moved back by four days for the whole of the UK to coincide with the 75th anniversary of VE Day.
- e. In response to a concern raised by Mr and Mrs Jones about an item in the minutes of the May meeting, the Chairman visited to discuss the issues. He explained that a nearby resident to Abbey House had become concerned that the new entrance might be exacerbating the flooding problem in Rectory Road. A very helpful conversation took place and both parties agreed that the next steps would be to confirm if the new entrance was on land belonging to Mr and Mrs Jones or on land belonging to Newton Green Trust. The Chairman of the Trust confirmed that it was now a land registry issue which was being investigated by the Trust solicitors.
