



Upon registering annually with the club and booking in at the professional's shop before play, residents of the village can enjoy nine holes free golf on the village green. All guests must pay a green fee. An extra nine holes on the private side of the course can be played after paying the appropriate fee at the club shop.

Villager-Plus Membership

To enjoy regular, 18-hole golf, residents can take out Villager-Plus membership of the club, which involves paying half the normal full, seven-day fee (£377.50 in 2017-18). Subject to the guidance of the professional's shop, play will be available daily from 10.30 am, and 12.30 pm on Saturdays. A condition of Villager Plus membership involves a free, one-hour, introductory session with the club professional.

IT'S ALL SO LONG AGO

Extracts from Parish Magazines from the past Compiled by Alan Vince – Village Historian

60 YEARS AGO – Newton Newsleaf produced by Rev A G Ensor. FEBRUARY 1959:

The Village Hall: The new chairs and tables bought for the Village Hall are most attractive. The promoters of the Whist Drives have done some hard work this season. A profit of £34 was made at the big Whist Drive and £15 at the weekly whist drives before Christmas. Mr Basil Taylor has made a chart showing the progress of the fund. It ought to be possible to get the next stage of the work done this coming summer. There will be a whist drive in aid of the blind on Thursday March 5th.

The Rector: One of my duties as Rector of Newton is to visit everyone who lives within the area of the parish whether or not they happen to be Church of England. It would be a great help to me if people would let me know at what time it is most convenient for me to come and see them and also let me know of any sick people who would like me to visit them. The object of visiting is to enable the parson to get to know his people and for them to get to know him and he naturally does not want to arrive at a time which is inconvenient so that he feels he is not wanted at that time.

40 YEARS AGO - Newton Newsletter edited by Frank Rowland FEBRUARY 1979:

The Playing Field: Many residents will not be aware that the Trust purchased the Playing Field from the executors of the late Mr C.F.Smith. This means of course that Newton will always have a sports ground, and that steps can now be taken to finalise a lease with the Golf Club. As with most financial transactions of this nature, the money for the purchase had to be borrowed, but the Trustees were extremely fortunate in that two residents of Newton loaned the money interest free. The purchase price was £7000 plus legal fees. Whilst rentals from the Golf Club will contribute towards repayment of the loan it will not be sufficient to repay it in full, or provide enough revenue to enable the Trust to carry out other works, or maintain the ponds and hedges that form part of the Green. Events will be run to help raise funds; individuals can help by either donation to the Trust or by Deed of Covenant payable over a period of years. Pleases give generously to this essential part of life in Newton.

Make-up assistant, Pat Rowland, and the wonderful tea ladies – Mesdames Parkinson, Campbell Lambert, Morris, Keatley, Somerville, Rufus, Finlay, Jill Marshall, Rosemary Green, and Daphne Cutler. MINUTES OF NEWTON PARISH COUNCIL MEETING Held on Wednesday 13th February 2019 at Newton Village Hall at 7.30pm

Councillors: Paul Presland (Chairman), Russell Bower, Sue Crawte (Vice Chairman), Rita Schwenk, Colin Poole, Lee Parker, Phil Taylor.

Attending

James Finch (Suffolk County Council), Adrian Beckham (Clerk), no members of the public were present.

19/19 Apologies for Absence

No apologies received.

19/20 Declaration of Interests and Requests for Dispensation

Cllr. Taylor declared an interest in Item 12 and would not take part in the discussion.

19/21 Minutes of meeting held on the 9th January 2018

The minutes of the meeting were approved by the councillors and signed by the Chairman as a correct record.

19/22 Public Forum

Clir. Lee Parker (Babergh District Council) provided a report. Items covered included:

- a. A full budget meeting is now planned for February 2019. So BDC will provide a full set of accounts by the end of February, and there will be more information at the next NPC meeting.
- b. Contrary to media reports, there are no plans to introduce parking charges in Sudbury
- BDC are very concerned about the loss of jobs at Philips Advent, Glemsford, and everything is being done to aid the workforce.
- d. 21 new council houses in Hadleigh have been approved.
- e. BDC are one of a small number of councils which distribute the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) to parish councils.

Clir. James Finch (Suffolk County Council) provided a report. Items covered included:

- a. SCC Cabinet have agreed recommendations to move forward with creating more specialist education places in Suffolk.
- Citizens Advice (CAB) now have funding for 2019/20 due to collaboration with Suffolk NHS Commissioning Groups.
- Suffolk Highways have announced that their new Thermal Patching Technology has allowed them to repair over 1700 potholes.
- d. 900 children are in care in Suffolk! An article on the subject will go into the February edition of the Box River News, and a poster will be sent to the clerk for display on the notice boards. Also; "drop in sessions" have now been arranged in:
 - The Church Hall, Bear Street, Nayland on Monday 25th 19.30 21.30
 - St Mary's House, Swan Street, Boxford on Monday 11th March 19.30 21.30
 - The Committee Room, Leavenheath Village Hall, Wrights Way 25th March 1930 21.30
- e. There are on-going problems with Broadband in Newton. Please let the Clerk know your name and landline phone number; if you can receive superfast broadband, but have not been connected
- f. Cllr. Finch agreed with the Council's concern over speeding traffic in Newton and would look into the possibility for funding of new road signs in the new financial year.

19/23 Hastoe Update


