



Guidance for golf on the green at Newton

Upon registering annually with the club and booking in at the professional's shop before play, residents of the village can enjoy nine holes free golf on the village green. All guests must pay a green fee. An extra nine holes on the private side of the course can be played after paying the appropriate fee at the club shop.

Villager-Plus Membership

To enjoy regular, 18-hole golf, residents can take out Villager-Plus membership of the club, which involves paying half the normal full, seven-day fee (£377.50 in 2017-18). Subject to the guidance of the professional's shop, play will be available daily from 10.30 am, and 12.30 pm on Saturdays. A condition of Villager Plus membership involves a free, one-hour, introductory session with the club professional.

60 YEARS AGO – Newton Newsleaf produced by Rev A G Ensor MARCH 1959:

What a treat it was to have several days of warm sunshine which was all the more welcome after the foggy weather we have had this winter.

Several people in the village have been suffering from influenza but we hope they will soon be better again.

The death of Mr Charles Blois in February came as a surprise to his friends. For many years he had been a sidesman at the church and often came in the summer months when his health allowed him to. He was a member of the 'old Guard' having had lifelong connections with Newton. May he rest in peace!

On Saturday March 7th, the wedding took place at the church of Miss Sylvia Vince and Mr Robert Clifford Lee of Rattlesden and we wish them every happiness in their married life. A.G.E.

40 YEARS AGO - Newton Newsletter edited by Frank Rowland MARCH 1979:

25 YEARS AGO – Newton Newsletter edited by Kathy Searles MARCH 1994:

Newton Parish Church: As most people in the village know, only the chancel is used for regular Sunday worship. The Nave is the responsibility of the Redundant Churches Fund. At the last funeral, when the nave was opened for the overflow from the Chancel, an amplifier, microphone and speakers were borrowed so that the people in the nave could feel part of the congregation. The Church Council are looking to purchase a simple amplification system which could also be made available for other events in the village. The cost is between £400 and £500 and an appeal is being made in the village to finance this purchase. S.C. Russell

APRIL 1994:

A Farm Workers Record of Service: April will see the start of a new era for Billy Marshall. He will be retiring from the job he has enjoyed with Oliver Farms for the last 51 years. 19/19 Apologies for Absence

Cllr.Taylor sent his apology.

19/20 Declaration of Interests and Requests for Dispensation None.

19/21 Minutes of meeting held on the 13th February 2019

The minutes of the meeting were approved by the councillors and signed by the Chairman as a correct record.

19/22 Public Forum

Clir. Parker (Babergh District Council) provided a report. Items covered included:

- a. Regret over the increase in Council Tax.
- A successful prosecution for fly-tipping resulted in the perpetrator being sentenced to 15 months in jail.
- c. Sudbury is looking for anyone who has memories or worked in the silk industry. Please contact the Sudbury Library.
- d. St Peter's Church, Sudbury, has had a cash injection of £100,000 with the aim to raise £2.5 million by 2020 through the National Lottery.
- The Council Elections will take place on 2nd May. If you want to vote, you must register by 12th April 2019.

Clir. Finch (Suffolk County Council) provided a report. Items covered included:

- a. Suffolk Fire and Rescue is asking the public for views on how it manages the risks it faces across the county.
- b. Children living in Suffolk who will be starting at a new school in Sept 2019, will be eligible for Suffolk County Council school travel when they live over 2 miles (under 8yrs), or 3 miles (aged 8 or over) walking distance to their nearest suitable school.
- c. 900 children are in care in Suffolk! Previous meetings have been well attended and it is hoped some will progress to become foster carers. The final "one to one drop in sessions" will take place at The Committee Room, Leavenheath Village Hall, Wrights Way, Leavenheath on Monday 25th March 7.30 9.30pm.
- d. There are on-going problems with Broadband in Newton. Please let the Clerk know your name and landline phone number; if you can receive superfast broadband, but have not been connected

Speeding through Newton

A member of the public raised concerns about speeding through Newton. The recent speed signs which had been installed at either end of the village, were too small, and they were obscured by trees. Cllr. Finch reported that more signs were due to be installed. Cllr. Bower requested that there would be an item on next months agenda to consider the installation of further speed limiting signs around the village.

Bus Shelters

A member of the public bought to the Council's attention the poor state of repair of the bus shelters. It was agreed that the clerk would investigate and report back at the next meeting.

19/23 Clerks Report and correspondence

MINUTES OF NEWTON PARISH COUNCIL MEETING Held on Wednesday 13th March 2019 at Newton Village Hall at 7.30pm

- a. Neighbourhood Planning Workshop: NNPT have been well supported by BDC. The initial meeting was a workshop and discussed problems and possible solutions. However, a subsequent tour of several housing development highlighted innovations being considered. NNP team will be meeting their Navigus Consultant on the 19/3/19 to discuss progress to date.
- b. Parish Liaison Meeting was attended by Cllrs Bower and Crawte: A thorough presentation was provided on the state income and expenditure for Babergh District Council. Cllr. Maybury also gave an interesting presentation regarding sheltered housing for young adults.
- c. Cllr. Schwenk has liaised with both land owners regarding the current permitted footpath behind Manders . Further consideration will be given to this matter after the elections, in June 2019.

19/24 Planning

- NPC strongly supports Hastoe's application to build four bungalows behind Alston close DC/19/00844 Erection of 4no dwellings. Site Off Alston Close Newton.
- NPC supported the Planning Application DC/19/00771 Erection of a single storey rear extension. Golf View Cottage Sudbury Road Newton
- c. NPC supported the Planning Application DC/19/01075 Erection of a single storey side extension and the insertion of rear dormer windows. 3 Links View, Newton.
- NPC supported the Application for Listed Building Consent DC/17/04074 / Full Planning Application - DC/19/01077. Reconstruction of barn to form extension to cart lodge conversion. Valley Farm Valley Road Newton.
- e. Updates on existing applications are contained in the Appendix.

19/25 Finance

- a. The Councillors received the residue funding from the former Newton Youth Club. This will be discussed at the April meeting.
- b. The councillors noted the income received since the last meeting, agreed the Reconciliation of Accounts against the Bank Statements and reviewed the Statement of Accounts against the budget.
- c. All cheques signed and due for signing, as itemised in the RFO Report (See Appendix), were authorised by the councillors.

Cllr. Finch (Suffolk County Council) provided a report. Items covered included:

- a. All of Suffolk's Recycling Centres will open from 9.00am to 5.00pm everyday from April to September. On Thursdays from May to August, all sites will be open until 7.00pm.
- b. 96% of pupils receive a place at their Preferred Secondary School. Some 7130 applicants received their first preference and 7651 applicants received an offer for one of their three preferred schools.
- c. 900 children are in care in Suffolk! Previous meetings have been well attended and it is hoped some will progress to become foster carers. There will be 3 further "one to one drop in sessions": The Church Hall, Bear Street, Nayland Monday 20th May 19.30 21.30; Mary's House, Swan Street, Boxford Thursday 6th June 19.30 21.30; The Garrard Room at the Bures Community Centre 24th June 1930 21.30.
- d. There are on-going problems with Broadband in Newton. Please let the Clerk know your name and landline phone number; if you can receive superfast broadband but have not been connected.




